We will make sure that every department should have its own question bank prepared by the faculty members of the department. This will be a distinctiveness of the College. One of the major complaints we received from the alumni regarding the curriculum is the lack of challenges for the advanced learners in the examination. Advanced learners need not work hard to do well in the examinations, as majority of the questions in the university question papers are either repetitions or predictable or too straight forward. These questions won't make much challenges to them. Being an affiliated college we cannot do anything with the external examinations of the University, we are trying something different in our internal examinations. It is proposed to have 20% questions in the internal examinations shall be questions which are not included in the question bank which are of higher cognitive level and these questions will be part of the existing question bank subsequent year. Hence we plan to augment question banks every year by introducing innovative questions of higher cognitive level.

Action Taken on the Basis of Feedbacks

1. Employers:

Employers are of the opinion that students have to be given some practical experience and more insight into the practical aspect of the subject they are studying. Hence the certificate course was introduced based on it. Moreover 3 year long project too was involved to instill the application spirit among the students.

2. Parents

Parents are worried about the excessive use of mobile phones by the students. They feel that the students are over concentrating on mobile phones. Most of the parents complained that students spent much time on mobile phones than studying. Hence it is proposed to engage students through mobile phones and tech enabled sources. Hence it is decided to implement LMS-Moodle which has mobile applications.

Annexure 4: Best Practices

4.1 Zero Hour Exams

The IQAC has elaborate discussions on the results of UG programmes published in 2016. All the members are of the opinion that there should be some urgent initiative to keep the pass percentage from further going down. Though the teachers are teaching portions according to their lesson plans and conducting remedial teaching it is observed that many students are not getting rewarded during the examinations. This may be due to the absence of regular study. Students has to study long portions just before the examinations. This creates a lot of pressure and tension which results in low pass percentages. Slow learners finds it difficult to study in pace with study the whole portions on the day immediate to exams.

Hence zero hour is introduced. Whole College works and additional half hour and exams are conducted. Exams are conducted based on the portions in the rpeseeding week. Hence students need to learn short portions everyday and it manadtes students to study every day.

4.1 Online Examination Registration

Sustainable development is an important aspect we stand for and the college should reflect it. As of now too much paper is wasted in the form of application form for semester examination. Recently a survey conducted by IQAC revealed that on the average 5.06 papers are used by a student for applying for university examinations an year (Two semester end exams, Two improvement exams and wastage). This accounts for almost 60Kg of paper an year= 1 tree every year.

Moreover there is a wastage of human resource in the exam registration. All the data collected through the exam registration forms needs to be entered into the software for the effective functioning of the exam cell. This shall be avoided if the students registrations are done directly in the college examination portal. Hence as a good practice we introduced online examonation registration this year.
